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It could also be .org, .edu, or one of many other TLDs. Each represents an entity type. These are commonly used TLDs: TLD .com is typically used by entities engaged in trade. TLD .org is used by nonprofits. TLD .edu is used by educational institutions. The .net TLD is for network providers. The TLD .gov is for government agencies. Moving to the left, the Acme part is the organization-specific name. It could be any name, including many family members such as Google.com, Target.com or Lifewire.com. The combination of your organization's name and TLD is also the address that is entered into a browser to access your organization's website. The website name and e-mail address are connected because they use the same domain—the combination of your organization's name and your TLD. Further to the left, the symbol of (at) is the connector between the domain and the person in that domain using the email address. In this case, the person is Jane. Simply put, when an email is sent to this address, the message is sent to Jane at Acme Corporation, which is a business entity. But computers need an easier way to understand this information, so email addresses use the Jane@Acme.com. An email address has the format username@entity. Tld. Only a few characters (mostly letters and numbers, as well as some punctuation marks such as dot or underscore) are allowed for email address names. The user name can be in a number of formats, including First Name (as above with Jane), FirstName.Last Name (for example, Jane.Doe), or Initial First, Last Name (for example, jdoe). Sometimes the names are capitalized, and sometimes I am. While email addresses are often specified with some uppercase letters, in practical use it doesn't matter if the email address contains uppercase letters. For example, if Jane's email address is Jane.Doe@Acme.com, the message might be sent to jane.doe@acme.com because the case isn't important and would still be delivered to Jane's mailbox. Jane, an email address of your Internet service provider, business, school, or web-based email service such as Gmail, Outlook.com, iCloud, or Yahoo! Mail. To get an email address that won't change when you change schools, processes, or service providers, create a custom personal domain (such as janedoe.com) and configure custom email addresses (such as jane@janedoe.com). Many people have multiple email accounts for personal use, work, and other purposes. In this way, communication for each area of life is separated from the others. When using multiple email accounts, check all accounts so you don't miss any messages. Desktop clients like Outlook can be connected to multiple accounts so they only have search in one place. While email addresses are convenient for communicating with people you want to stay in touch with, they can also be a place for those you don't want in your life to contact you, including intrusive sellers, spammers, and scammers. Every time you give your email address, you risk receiving spam. This is because companies that collect your email address to conduct business with you often hand it over to other entities that may have less honorable intentions. To sign up for online stores, services, and newsletters without providing your real email address, use a disposable email address instead. The temporary address forwards all messages to the primary address. When you receive spam at the address, turn it off without affecting your real email address. By Laurel Storm When sending an email, the opening greeting often sets the tone for the entire message, just as the paper letter does for its older cousin. Directing an email to a person - or even two people - is usually quite simple, but when you send the same message to three or more people things can start to get a little confusing, and you run the risk of inadvertently offending someone. Create your greetings carefully to make sure your messages are taken the right way. Determine what you know about the three people you're emailing. If you have the same amount of information about all of them, creating a greeting is simple: Dear Jim, John and Jane or Dear Mr. Smith, Mr. Doe and Ms. Brown, depending on the level of formality. Sometimes, however, you may not know anything important about one of the three people. For example, Jim Smith is obviously a man and Jane Brown a woman, but Alex Jones can be either Alexander or Alexandra. In that case, use the full name for all three people - Dear Jim Smith, Jane Brown and Alex Jones. Often, the level of formality indicated by the greeting affects the content of the entire email. If the three people you're facing deserve different levels of formality, take in sending two or three separate messages rather than just one. If you absolutely need to send only one message, contact each person with the appropriate level of formality rather than increasing or lowering it. For example, if you are emailing the and two of your classmates, they open the message with Dear Professor Keating, Neil and Todd. Consider whether the three people you send the message to should be included in a single conversation. For example, if you're inviting three of your friends to a party, it makes sense to use a single message; if you're throwing a party and three of your friends are helping, on the other hand, it might be better to send three separate messages, each of which contains only the relevant information. If you absolutely need to send only one message, contact the three recipients as usual in the greeting, but also do your best to identify which parts of the message are relevant to each of them. When directing email recipients in the greeting formula, consider how the message is reaching them. If you send an email to all three recipients using the To: or Cc:, include all three people in the greeting as usual, unless the message is primarily intended for one of the recipients and just sent to the other two for their information. If so, contact the primary recipient in the greeting formula and explain why you are sending the message to the other two in the first lines as well. If one or more people receive the message through the Bcc: field, make sure you don't include that person in the greeting formula to avoid the offense.
